Important safety information



Read the operating instructions carefully and in full before working with the device.

Ensure that the operating instructions are accessible at any time for all users. When an SD is used in the device, it can also be stored on the same as a PDF file.

If transferring the MultiControl CT device to third parties, ensure these operating instructions are always included.

Intended use

The MultiControl CT is designed to control cooling circuits.

As a conductivity measurement device, you can use a suitable conductivity probe to monitor the conductivity in aqueous media and to regulate process water circuits.

Comply with the output limits specified in the "<u>Technical Data</u>" section.

The scope of intended use presumes that you have read and understood the instructions and particularly the section on "Important safety information".

Improper use is deemed to occur if you use the device

- outside the applicable scope, as specified in these instructions,
- under operating conditions that deviate from the scope specified in these instructions.

Qualification of personnel



The assembly and commissioning require basic electrical and process engineering expertise as well as knowledge of the applicable specialist terms. The assembly and commissioning must therefore be performed only by a specialist or a properly trained person instructed and supervised by a specialist.

A specialist is a person who can draw on professional training, knowledge and experience as well as knowledge of applicable provisions to assess work assigned to him/her, detect potential hazards and implement suitable safety measures. A specialist must comply with the applicable professional rules.

Warnings in this manual

These instructions include warnings against specified actions that involve the risk of injury or property damage. Warnings are structured as follows:

General Information

- During assembly and commissioning, observe the specific national and local requirements.
- Observe the accident prevention and conservation requirements in the country of use and at the installation site.
- Make no changes or modifications to the device that go beyond the scope of use specified in these instructions. Doing so will void the warranty.

Requirements for the installation site

Ensure that the following conditions are met at the installation site:

- · Use the device in indoor locations only.
- The ambient temperature is between 10 and 40°C.
- The installation site is at altitudes under 2000 m.

- The maximum relative humidity is 80% at temperatures of up to 31°C (linear declining up to 50% relative humidity at 40°C).
- The device must always be protected against wetness and moisture. Under no circumstances may it be exposed to splashed water or condensate.
- Surge category II
- · Soiling degree II

Requirements of cable for mains voltage and system components and installed lines

Use only cables and installed lines which meet the following requirements:

- Dielectric strength 30 V ... 260 V according to the nominal voltage (see specification plate)
- The cable ducts installed by Gebr. Heyl in the device have a clamping range of 4.5 mm 10 mm. This means that the external diameter of the laid cable must remain within the range of 4.5 mm 10 mm. If you use other ducts, the cable diameters must correspond to the ducts.
- The terminal strips on the circuit board require core cross-sections of between 0.08 mm² and 2.5 mm². This applies to single-wire and fine-wire cores with wire end ferrules without plastic collar. For fine-wire cores with wire end ferrules and plastic collar, the cross-section may be up to 1.5 mm².
 For single-wire cores, AWG28 AWG12 can also be used.

Requirements for cable ducts

- The recesses in the housing are intended for M16 ducts.
- The ducts should have a smooth and rounded opening (to protect against bending and abrasion).
- Be careful to ensure securely fastened bending protection, which must be five times the length of the maximum cable diameter.
- The duct should include a strain relief that prevents slippage of the cable and that cannot be disengaged without a tool.
- You can order cable ducts from us as spare parts (Art. No. 13500).
 If you use another cable duct, the material must have a flammability rating of V1 or better.

During assembly

- Always disconnect the relevant system component from the power source before assembling the device or connecting it to the power supply or disconnecting it from the same. Prevent any inadvertent reactivation of the device.
- Only connect the device to the mains voltage as specified on the type plate.



- Observe the technical data and the environmental parameters.
- The connections for mains voltage and relay outputs must be laid separately from each other, to guarantee corresponding insulation between the cables. Accordingly, do not operate the device if the partition walls or terminal area covers are not present.

NOTE

Avoiding interference voltages

The MultiControl CT device requires stable and uninterrupted supply voltage. Where applicable, use a mains filter to shield the MultiControl CT device from interference voltages, which may be generated for example within the network by magnetic valves or large-scale engines. Never lay the connecting cables in parallel to mains cables.



Handling may cause damage or destruction of electrical components!

If you need to open the upper door, you should take the necessary safety measures to avoid electrostatic discharge onto the components (ESD safety).

Make sure you are earthed before opening the casing.



During operation

- The device has no power switch.
 - Use an external power switch to turn the unit on and off. The switch must be installed next to the device and must be marked as power switch for the device for example with a label.
- Ensure that the maximum electrical load capacity of the switching outputs is not exceeded, particularly for inductive loads. The power supply for the user inclusive device is secured with a 4A fuse, which means the total of all loads must not reach 4A.
- In the event of any malfunctions, immediately switch off the Multi-Control CT device and inform the service personnel. Never attempt to repair the MultiControl CT device yourself. Doing do will invalidate the guarantee. Repairs must be performed by authorized service personnel only.

During cleaning

• Only use a dry and lint-free cloth.

Malfunctions/repairing a defective device


- A defective device, regardless of the guarantee period, can be serviced only when the device is dismantled and the error is described. Make no changes or modifications to the device that go beyond the scope of use specified in these instructions. Doing so will void the warranty. Remove the power pack and send it back in the original packaging.
 - Before dismantling, the type of error must be noted (error number, error effect, log file of the SD card).
- Once a protective device has been triggered (safety fuse), initially
 try resolving the cause of error (e.g. by replacing a defective
 valve), before reactivating the protective device. Frequent triggering always signifies an error, which under certain circumstances
 may also damage the device.

During disposal

 Dispose of the device in accordance with the regulations of your country.



- Careful handling of the device enhances the operational safety and the service life! With this in mind, perform a visual inspection of the device at regular intervals as follows:
 - Is the door of the device carefully closed?
 - o Is the device excessively soiled?
- Problem-free operation is contingent on regular maintenance!
 Maintenance and care instructions can be found in the "Servicing and maintenance" section.
- Indications of problems can be found in the "<u>Error messages/troubleshooting</u>" section.

Service description

The MultiControl CT can optionally be used as a measurement device for conductivity or for the total dissolved solids TDS or as a controller of cooling circuits.

As a conductivity measurement device, you can use a suitable conductivity probe to monitor the conductivity in aqueous media and to regulate process water circuits.

As a control system you can implement desalination and dosing functions in cooling circuits.

The device has the features:

- Simplified menu-driven operation and programming via <u>back</u>lit graphic LCD.
- Alternatively, connecting a conductivity probe:
 - Inductive conductivity probe with integrated temperature sensor without pH-measurement with inserted probe adaptor card.
 - Measuring converter as inductive conductivity probe when the <u>EC inductive/pH card</u> is used. The measuring converter transmits conductivity and temperature via two 20 mA interfaces. Additional pH measurement.
 - Conductive conductivity probe with PT100/PT1000 temperature sensor when <u>EC/pH card</u> is used. The temperature sensor can be connected as 2-, 3-, or 4wire circuit. Additional pH measurement.
 - If pH measurement is available, a pH probe with temperature sensor/platinum sensor PT100 or PT1000 and 2-, 3-, or 4-wire circuit can be used.
- Five outputs (with neutral change-over contacts):
 - Three relays for the control of inhibitor and biocide dosing pumps, alternatively for a circulation pump.
 - One output to connect a motor or solenoid valve for desalination.
 - One <u>Fault signal output</u>
- Six potential-free inputs with adjustable polarity:
 - o Water meter
 - Stop/Standby
 - o flow monitor
 - Three level switches for biocides/inhibitor
- <u>Logging</u> on SD card for <u>measurement data</u> and <u>notifications/alarms</u> (with interim buffer for 100 measurement values and 50 notifications).
- Battery-supported clock
- Various diagnostic options:

- LEDs for display of input and switching states
- Displaying the states of all inputs incl. current inputs in the diagnostics menu
- Manual switching of all outputs
- o Logging of all status changes on SD card
- <u>Import</u> and <u>Export</u> of settings (basic program data) with selectable filenames.
- Firmware update via SD card
- Features for integration into process controllers:
 - <u>Fault signal output</u> (neutral changeover contact)
 - Serial <u>RS232</u> interface to transfer measurement data and notifications/alarms
 - Input <u>Stop</u>
 - Optional <u>ADI plug-in card</u> with 2 x 20 mA current interfaces and second RS232 interface

Installation

Prior to installation



Risks resulting from incorrect installation!

MultiControl CT is protected against splash water and dust. Highpressure water and excessive dust will damage the instrument.

- ➤ Install MultiControl CT at a location where it is protected against high-pressure water, dust and aggressive substances e. g. in a switch cabinet or on a suitable wall.
- > Remove the Terminal box cover.

Assembling the MultiControl CT

- ➤ Secure the device with one of the supplied screws in a suitable position in the switching cabinet or on the wall.
- > Secure the MultiControl CT with a screw in each case.

Connecting the power supply and devices




Risk of electric shocks during installation!

If the power supply is not disconnected prior to installation, it may result in physical injuries, destruction of the product or damage to plant parts.

- ➤ Disconnect the relevant plant parts before installing MultiControl CT
- Only use tested cables with sufficient cross-sections for the connections.

Disconnecting device for the power supply

The unit has no power switch!



Fit the MultiControl CT with a switch as a disconnecting device for the power supply. Use an appliance switch or a circuit breaker that meets the requirements of IEC 608947-1 and IEC 60947-3. The switch must be within easy reach of the user of the MultiControl CT and clearly marked as a disconnecting device for the Multi-Control CT.






Installing the terminal compartment cover

For technical safety reasons, the terminal compartment cover must be put back in place immediately after connecting the mains voltage and the system components, since the terminal space houses cables that carry dangerous voltages. This helps prevent inadvertent contact with the terminals and contact between the individual lines that may carry different voltages and thus avoid the risk of a life-threatening electric shock.

Also ensure that the cables are not pinched when installing the terminal compartment cover!



Risk of damages caused by electromagnetic fields!

If the MultiControl CT or the connecting cables are installed parallel to power cables or in close proximity to electromagnetic fields, the instrument may be damaged or measurements may be erroneous.



Observe ESD safety precautions! See the information on page 8

- ➤ Always install measuring and control cables separately from power cables.
- > Always earth the instrument.
- ➤ Protect the MultiControl CT against interference voltages e. g. via a mains filter.
- > Shield the instrument against strong electromagnetic fields.
- Refer to the rating plate for the appropriate power supply.
- > Connect the power supply to terminals 1–3.

The following devices can be connected to the MultiControl CT:

- Various consumers, e.g. pumps, motors or solenoid valves
- Sensors
- Output devices

NOTE

Motor valve with direct-current voltage

If a motor valve is used with direct-current voltage, observe the motor valve's documentation. An additional pole turning relay to reverse the direction of rotation must be used where applicable






Indicate external voltage on the relay contacts!

If you connect system components that do not operate using the device voltage, you can apply external voltages to the relay contacts. This external voltage <u>cannot</u> be switched off via the external mains switch.

There is a danger of electric shock!

Affix a warning to the device in this case (e.g. a sticker as shown left).



Power consumption

The maximum power consumption of all relay outputs shall not exceed 920 W (at 230V) / 4 A.

After installation

- > Replace the terminal box cover.
- > Tighten the screws at the terminal box cover.

Checklist for assembly and installation

1. Installation:

- a. Outputs: Are the pumps and horn/alarm system connected?
- b. Inputs: Is the level switch connected?
- c. Sensors: Is the measuring converter connected to the plug-in card?
- d. Plug-in card for measurement: Has the switch panel been configured?

2. MultiControl CT configuration:

- a. Has the <u>polarity of the level switch and other inputs</u> been configured?
- b. Has the level switch's function been checked in the inputs diagnosis menu?
- c. Has the transfer of the sensor values been checked, or in the <u>inputs diagnosis menu</u> where applicable?
- d. Has pump operation been checked in the <u>outputs diagnosis menu</u> (all switching relays)?
- e. Is the SD card plugged in to log the data?

The MultiControl CT should now be ready for setting up the system parameters such as limit values and dosing intervals.

Additional recommendations:

Additional recommendations.


- Once you have made all the settings, export them to the SD card and to a second card, which is kept as a backup under lock and key. Should the settings be changed unintentionally, they can easily be restored.
- Place the manual near to the device or place the manual as a PDF file on the SD card. Thus it is always at hand.
- Archive the system circuit diagram and the system's schematic diagram. Even if you know your system well, our customer support does not know it and requires this documentation when you require support.







Control elements on the control board

- **Battery holder**: The battery holder houses a CR2032 lithium battery to retain the time setting even if the device is switched off.
- RESET button: To reset the controller, proceed as for switching on and off
- **BOOT button**: Only used when a menu-driven firmware update is not possible.
- The micro SD card on the control board must not be removed!





- ➤ The conductive conductivity probe is connected to LF1/2.
- The two temperature sensors for conductivity and pH can be detected using a 2, 3 or 4 wire measurement. Both PT100 and PT1000 sensors can be used.
- The pH probe itself is connected to the BNC bush on the circuit board. This bush has a bayonet locking device. Ensure that the connection is locked.

Connecting the plug-in card EC inductive/pH



- The current interface of the inductive conductivity probe is connected to LF. If the probe has a temperature output, it is connected to Temp. If no temperature sensor is available, the temperature can be entered manually.
- The pH probe itself is connected to the BNC bush on the circuit board. Ensure that the BNC connector's bayonet locking device is locked.
- ➤ 24V / 0.2A are available for the power supply of a measuring converter.
- ➤ The temperature sensor of the pH probe is connected to RTDIN+ and RTDIN- (and GND as shielding). A PT100 or PT1000 sensor can be connected. 2, 3 or 4 wire measure-


ment is possible. To do so, the switch panel on the circuit board must be configured according to the following section.

Measuring error if the temperature sensor is incorrectly set




➤ The temperature sensor's default setting is PT100 2 wire measurement. If you use a PT1000 sensor or a 3 or 4 wire measurement, the switch setting must be adjusted as oth-erwise a large measuring error will inevitably occur!





Probe adaptor card



Connecting the measuring converters

Jumo CTI-500

Follow the procedure described in the Jumo probe user manual if the probe with display is used.

There is little information on the CTI-500 without display/keyboard in the manual. Therefore the connection is explained here.

The following is necessary for the configuration:

- Jumo PC interface with converter USB/TTL (Jumo parts no. 00456352)
- Configuration software Jumo parts no. 00447634 (available as a free trial version for 30 days)

The following steps must be carried out:

- Unzip the CD or installation archive and install the driver for the USB TTL adapter (adapter must not be plugged in). It is a 'FTDI driver' V 2.8.14. Please check whether the version is correct. Newer drivers may be available as this driver is relatively old. These may, however, not be suitable.
- 2. After installation: Attach the TTL/USB adapter to the USB. Read off and note the COM port in the device manager. You will require this later for the software.
- 3. Start the Jumo installation program or insert the CD of the Jumo CTI probe and install the software.
- 4. Supply the probe with 24V (1+, 2-). When switching on, the LEDs K1 and K2 must light up for a few seconds.
- 5. Switch off 24 V.
- 6. Use the abovementioned PC interface with converter USB/TTL. Connect the TTL cable which consists of RJ45 connector (plug in to the blue adapter); attach the pin connector to the 4-pin adapter. Attach the adapter to the open probe during SETUP. Due to the mechanical coding there is only one option.
- 7. Switch on the probe's power supply; USB is plugged in. The yellow LED on the USB/TTL RJ45 must light up.
- 8. Start the installed Jumo software under point 3; data transfer (press connect).
- 9. The 'Connection setup wizard' window appears:
 - 1. Enter the probe's name under Info (for identification in the list that appears later)
 - 2. Press next
 - 3. Communication interface is grey; the serial interface is selected
 - 4. Press next
 - 5. 'Check COM ports' appears briefly
 - 6. In the settings for the serial interface select: Connected to < listed COM port see above>

- Transfer rate: 9600 baud (default)
 Control signal: RS232 setup interface (TTL), default
- 7. Press next
- 8. Device address: 1 (must remain 1!), press next
- 9. Confirm the overview with Finish.
- Connection is established and should work. When data are transferred, the green LED on the RJ45 connector flashes.
- 11. The wizard is closed. Now a table appears below with date, time, name, value. It is constantly updated. These are already data from the probe.
- 12. Setup: File, select New
- 13. A tree structure appears. Double-click on the names to open the window. The probe data is entered there. Interesting are:
 - Interface configuration in analogue output conductivity
 - 2. Interface configuration in analogue output temperature
 - Measuring range in analogue input conductivity
 - 4. Measuring range in analogue input temperature
- 14. After all settings have been made, select 'Data transfer to the device' in the menu.
- 15. Save settings as file, Save
- 10. Program can be terminated.
- 11. Standard settings are: 4-20 mA interface, temperature scaling 0..150°C, range 2 0-1000 μs/cm.
- 12. The measuring ranges for conductivity and temperature must of course be configured in an identical manner in the probe and in the MultiControl CT!
- 13. In addition, the displayed temperature can be selected between different sensors. For the Jumo probe's temperature sensor, select in the menu:
 - BASIC PROGRAM \Rightarrow TEMPERATURE \Rightarrow TEMP. Display \Rightarrow LF
- 14. Recheck if the probe's measurement values are identical in the Jumo software and for the MultiControl CT, and, where applicable, recheck if the transfer of the currents is working correctly using the <u>Diagnosis menu</u> under IN mA.

Kuntze Neon LF

The Neon LF operates as a measuring converter, which controls the inductive probe Kuntze IL15 and the built-in NTC and passes on the measurement values to the MultiControl CT via two 20 mA interfaces. If the Neon LF comes with the 24V option, it can be supplied by the MultiControl CT. A 6 wire control cable is required for connection:

 - The MultiControl CT must be configured accordingly, in the menu



The compensation of the temperature influence is set in <u>temperature</u> <u>compensation</u>.

The sensitive part of the measuring cell must not rest on or touch a surface. Otherwise, the measured value will be distorted!

The loop may consist of only one turn!

Other measuring converters

The conductivity and optional temperature measurement signals must be provided as isolated 0-20 mA or 4-20 mA current signals.


Any control cable (wire cross-section max. 0.5 mm²) can be used for the connection. Connect the cable according to the <u>terminal assignment of the EC inductive/pH card</u>.

Set the scaling of the current signal on the measuring converter and MultiControl CT in the same way.

Check if the transfer of the currents is working correctly using the $\underline{\text{Diagnosis menu}}$ under $\underline{\text{IN}}$ $\underline{\text{mA}}$.

Commissioning

After you have mounted the device and the connections of the plug-in card and the motherboard, you can optionally insert an SD card.



Mounting the SD card (optional)

- ➤ Slide the SD card into the slot provided in the front panel (SD card's contact row on the right)
- Gently press in the SD card until it audibly clicks and locks into position.
- > The process of mounting the SD card is now complete.

Further information on possible errors is included in the section <u>Error messages/troubleshooting</u>. How and whether these errors are shown can be configured in the <u>Alarm/message</u> menu.

Display

The operating display appears after switching on the instrument. If an error occurs, the display switches to the respective error message. Furthermore, the display shows the menu and enables programming of MultiControl CT.

The graphical backlit display has a resolution of 202x32 dots, corresponding to two lines, each with 25 digits.

Operating display

The display shows the temperature of the fluid on the top left at the selected sensor (in the conductivity or pH probe) in the normal state, the pH value on the bottom left and the conductivity in μ S/cm or the total dissolved solids in ppm on the right.

Signal lamps

All signal lamps are three-coloured (green/orange/red) except for the alarm lamp (red only) and the maintenance lamp (yellow only) (for the position of the LEDs see page 16). The meaning of the lamps and colours are:

LV2: Red indicates that the limit value for temperature has been exceeded

- Pump: Green if circulation pump is running.
- Maintenance: Yellow if maintenance period has elapsed
- Alarm: Red for an alarm where the message type is set to 'Message' or 'Alarm signal'.

Function characteristics of the controller for cooling circuits

Desalination function

The desalination valve opens when the upper limit value is exceeded. However, this is only possible when metering does not occur and there is no desalination lock. If the lower limit value is not achieved, the desalination valve closes again. It is possible to monitor the maximum desalination duration.


Metering function - Solenoid valve

If the entered interval has expired or the set weekday is reached, a metering valve, e.g., opens at the set time for the set duration. At the end of metering, the locking time is started while desalination is prevented. This is only possible once the locking time has expired. It is possible to select a time-limited pre-bleeding before the metering.

Metering function - Motor valve



Link between time and correct data

Interim storage for a non-inserted SD card

Even if no SD card is currently inserted, no measurement values and errors are lost, since the most recently error and measurement values, which have not yet been written into storage, are saved on internal interim storage (ring memory).

As soon as an SD card is inserted, the interim stored data is transmitted

The capacity of this interim buffer is 50 error and 100 measurement values. After this point, the oldest values will be overwritten.

The storage requirement for 10,000 measurement values amounts to around 1MByte. If error messages occur for one percent of the measurement values, a 2GB SD card for example may have around 19 million measurement values and errors.



Error and update log

During the update a file called "update.txt" is written onto the SD card, which includes a record of the update progress and any errors having occurred in the process.

Open these files with your editor of choice (e.g. Notepad), to read the relevant content.

The file is not deleted, but supplemented. If the same SD card is always used for a device, it will provide an overview of all the firmware updates performed for the device in question.



Manual firmware update

The manual firmware update facilitates the recovery of software after failed firmware updates. The device buttons are not used in the process.

- Press and hold the RESET button and the BOOT button on the control board. Release the RESET button and press down the BOOT button for 5 additional seconds. The update process progresses in the manner described for a menu-driven update.

Errors that arise are registered with time and date – if the battery of the clock is not empty. The number of error messages can be exported or read out, but not the error history itself.

Calibrating the probes

pH probe

Before using the device, you must calibrate the pH probe.

The pH probe is calibrated with the aid of two buffer solutions (two-point calibration). The pH value of each solution should be as far apart as possible. Since the values of the buffer solutions are temperature-dependent, the type of temperature compensation must first be selected.

Enter the temperature of the buffer solution.

SERVICE Calibrating pH Proceed as follows for the calibration:

➤ The pH values of the two buffer solutions are set in SERVICE ⇒ Calibrating pH ⇒ Buffer solution 1 pH and ⇒ Buffer solution 2 pH.

- > The calibration is started with Start (OK).
- > The result is shown under Slope.

Reset calibration to standard values

To cancel incorrect calibration, either repeat the calibration process, as described in the previous section, or reset calibration as follows:

> Select and confirm

SERVICE \Rightarrow Calibrating pH \Rightarrow Reset (OK).

Calibration is reset to the standard value. Your measuring system is not calibrated! The calibration reset is registered with the time and date.

Conductivity probe

If the EC/pH card is installed, a conductive conductivity probe can be connected to the MultiControl CT. Calibrate the probe including the temperature probe as follows.

The most precise measurements are achieved via two-point calibration. To achieve this, calibrate

- the zero point
- and the target value

of the conductivity probe.

Zero point calibration

Measuring error (offset) caused, e.g., by a temperature drift in the measuring system can be counterbalanced via zero point calibration. If zero point calibration is not carried out, the measuring results will be less exact.

- Ensure that the probe with the final cable length has been connected, but is completely dry and not wetted with the measuring medium.
- > Select the menu items

SERVICE ⇒ Calibrating CD

⇒ Calibration CD zero.

> Press **OK** to start zero point calibration.

Zero point calibration finishes automatically. MultiControl CT corrects the measuring error by forming the difference.

> Subsequently execute target value calibration.

Target value calibration

Measuring errors which are caused by a soiled probe can be corrected via target value calibration. Target value calibration is particularly suitable if there are high accuracy requirements in a limited measuring range. Furthermore, this method allows you to carry out measurements whose cell constant is unknown with a probe.

Depending on the application, the target value can be calibrated in three different ways:

- Calibration without temperature compensation
- Calibration with temperature compensation for constant medium temperature
- Calibration with temperature compensation for variable medium temperature.

Calibration without temperature compensation

Carry out calibration without temperature compensation when the temperature of the medium is approx. 15 C and remains constant.

To achieve this, the correction factor determined from a comparison measurement and the display has to be entered manually.

Formula to calculate the correction factor:

➤ Enter the correction factor evaluated as described above under SERVICE ⇒ Calibrating CD ⇒ Factor. The entered correction factor is immediately operative.

Calibration with temperature compensation for constant medium temperature

If a **probe without temperature sensor** is used, the temperature of the medium has to be entered. Proceed as follows:

- ➤ Select and confirm the "manual" option in the menu BASIC PROGRAM ⇒ Temperature ⇒ CD temp. sensor
- ➤ Enter the temperature of the calibration solvent under BASIC PROGRAM ⇒ Temperature ⇒Temp. compensation ⇒ Manual temp.





Risk of incorrect measured values!

If calibration is not carried out or an unsuitable calibration solvent is used, it will result in incorrect measured values.

Always calibrate with a calibration solvent in accordance with DIN EN 27888



- > Dip the measuring probe into the calibration solvent as shown left.
- After inserting a probe with temperature sensor, wait approx.
 2 minutes before starting calibration, thus ensuring that the probe has the same temperature as the solvent.
- ➤ Select and confirm SERVICE ⇒ Calibrating CD ⇒ Start(OK).
- > Press **OK** to start target value calibration.

Calibration finishes automatically. MultiControl CT corrects the measuring error by forming a correction factor.

The calibration is registered with the time and date.

Reset calibration to standard values

Inductive conductivity probe

The MultiControl CT does not contain any settings for calibration since the transmitted values are simply adopted from the current interface of the EC inductive/pH card. On the contrary, the current interface's scaling (Measuring range CD and temperature measuring range) must be configured correctly. Follow the manufacturer's instructions provided in the guide for the probe.

Factory settings

Servicing and maintenance

The MultiControl CT itself is virtually maintenance-free. However, we recommend that you back up the data of a SD card used once a month.

Replacing the backup battery

When the device is switched off the internal clock is powered by a lithium backup battery (CR2032 type), which is designed to have a service life of 10 years. After this period, it should be replaced for preventive reasons, and always ensuring a measured voltage <2.3V.

The following is required when replacing the battery

- · A Phillips-tip screwdriver (insulated)
- A replacement battery CR 2032

Replace the battery as follows:

- Disconnect the device from the power supply
- > Open the cover
- Using a non-conductive tool, carefully prise the used battery out of its mounting on the <u>control board</u>. Avoid damaging the circuit board with the sharp edge of a screwdriver.
- > Insert the replacement battery
- > Close the cover again
- > Reconnect the power supply once again
- The date and time must now be <u>reset</u>.







Replacing fuses

The main fuses F1 and F2 (T4A) are on the motherboard as a glass fuse in the holder (connections on the motherboard). If the voltage supply of 230V is applied to the device and no voltage can be measured at the terminals, then one of these fuses is defective.

The pluggable 230V power supply board with transformer contains the primary fuse F2 (T160 mA) and the secondary fuse F3 (T1.6A). Both are pluggable (fuses on the power supply pack plug-in card).

If the result of the preceding test that 230V is applied, and the 3.3V/12V LEDs do not light up, then one of these fuses is defective. Use a multimeter to determine the state of the fuses by means of a continuity test.

Troubleshooting

The MultiControl CT comes with extensive capabilities for the detection of errors. If the device does not appear to be behaving properly, please remember that the device is part of a system with many sensors. If these sensors are not working correctly, incorrect inputs are generated, which can lead to the malfunction of the device.

Therefore please check in such cases:

- Device settings: You can view the device settings in the <u>Information menu</u> or, where applicable, <u>export the SD card</u> and verify easier with a text editor.
- ➤ Input signals of the sensors and level switches: <u>Service menu diagnosis</u>.
- Output relay: To check whether the connected pumps or horns are working, the <u>Diagnostic menu</u> is also used. The outputs can be switched for test reasons.
- ➤ The <u>change log</u> is an additional aid. In order to understand the controller's handling, the changes to all inputs and outputs are logged in a file with a time stamp.

Should problems or questions arise while operating MultiControl CT which are not described in these operating instructions and/or cannot be solved, please contact our technical hotline.

Try to identify the problem as accurately as possible and record the actions and conditions under which it occurred. This will enable us to offer you swift effective assistance.

In order to help you with system problems, we require:

- > The device settings
- ➤ The system's wiring diagram
- ➤ The system's flow chart

Error messages/troubleshooting

Errors will be recorded in the error history as far as capacity allows (after which the oldest message will be deleted).

In addition, <u>error messages can be stored on the SD card</u>, if in the menu

BASIC PROGRAM => SD Card => Save alarms has been activated.

Details of errors are always sent via the serial RS32 interface.

Errors are handled differently depending on type:

All errors, for which user access is required to recover the function of the device, are shown as alerts. In addition, an alarm may be triggered. However, it is not possible to completely disable the message, since the selection "—" is locked in the menu.

In the event of any recurrence, the configured action (message or alarm) is again triggered. The time of occurrence is recorded in the alarm log. These errors include:

All errors that occur only intermittently, which means they impact only on the analysis process, are cyclically checked by the device and automatically deleted when no longer present.

If these error messages are acknowledged, only the alarm is deactivated. The error message is not, however, deleted. It is deleted only when the error no longer occurs after rechecking.

These errors can also be ignored when in the <u>Alarm/message</u> is selected.

Likewise, two notification messages are written via the serial interface and onto the SD card with the start and end times of the error (see Message format).

EMC malfunctions due to the solenoid valves

The MultiControl CT complies with the applicable EMC directives. However, we are aware of cases where devices have been disabled due to voltage spikes from solenoid valves.

The devices worked again after restarting, but no safe system operation is guaranteed.

We therefore recommend that solenoid valves, if not already integrated, be equipped with additional so-called 'RC quenching circuits'.

RC circuits, which are connected in parallel to the valve connections, are typical. We recommend values for R = 100 Ω and C = 100 nF.

Some solenoid valves are only equipped with varistors as voltage limiters. Again, we recommend the use of RC quenching circuits.

Error messages after self-test



When switched on, the MultiControl CT performs a self-test automatically and then monitors its own state continuously. If the LEDs under the LCD display (see Operating display) flash red after switching on (flash frequency 10 Hz), an error has occurred after the self-test. The error message is placed on the SD card in the error log, even when the "Saving changes" function is inactive.

Firmware update error list



Rapidly flashing (10Hz) *green* LEDs under the LCD display identify a bootloader error during a firmware update (for comparison: *red* flashing LEDs in the event of self-test errors).

The error category is based on the number of simultaneously flashing LEDs on the control card (for the precise error description, please refer to the following table):

- All five LEDs flash quickly: SD card cannot be read. Replace card. If the attempted replacement fails, there is a defect on the control card. Contact customer support; the device must be repaired.
- Three or four LEDs flash quickly: Defect on the control card. Contact customer support; the device must be repaired.
- Two LEDs flash quickly: The file for the firmware update was found, but is invalid or defective. Re-download the file.
- One LED flashes quickly: Problem with SD card (Write protection, formatting).
- For the MultiControl CT the filename should correspond to the following format: 200M001S00.UPD, where 001 is the version number, which increases incrementally as new versions are released.
- Green LED bar not extended: It reverts to the original configuration after some time has elapsed and starts from scratch: That means that during the programming, an error was detected and an attempt was made to resolve the error by repeating the update process. The entire programming process is repeated up to five times The entire programming process is repeated up to five times. For each repeat, the entire programming process is relaunched from the start, whereupon the LED bar "emerge".

 If, after five attempts, it is still impossible to perform any successful update, the LEDs show an error corresponding to the list on the following page. The device or the control card requires repair. Please also send particularly in this case the content of the log file on the SD card "update.txt" with the item or enclose the SD card with the device.

Under normal cases, a firmware update is completed within 70 seconds.






Structure of service menu




Structure of basic programming




Middle part of the menu tree
