# **1** General information

# **1.1** Use and storage of the instruction manual

The device is a system component. Accordingly, you should also observe the Testomat PRO<sup>®</sup> Ca SELF CLEAN maintenance manual and the system documentation of the system manufacturer.

We reserve the right to make structural changes with continual improvement in mind!

# 1.3.2 Intended use

The scope of use of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN is the automatic determination and monitoring of the residual total hardness (water hardness) in water.

- Comply with the output limits specified in the chapter 3 <u>Technical</u> <u>Data</u> on page 6.
- 2. Observe the areas/limits of application of the reagents and the requirements imposed by the medium to be measured.

The scope of intended use presumes that you have read and under-stood the instructions and particularly the section on chapter 2 <u>Your safety</u> on page 4

Improper use is deemed to occur if you use the device

outside the applicable scope, as specified in these instructions,



- under operating conditions that deviate from the scope specified in these instructions.

# 1.3.3 Qualification of personnel

The assembly and commissioning require basic electrical and pro-cess engineering expertise as well as knowledge of the applicable specialist terms. The assembly and commissioning must therefore be performed only by a specialist or a properly trained person in-structed and supervised by a specialist.

A specialist is a person who can draw on professional training, knowledge and experience as well as knowledge of applicable provisions to assess work assigned to him/her, detect potential hazards and implement suitable safety measures. A specialist must comply with the applicable professional rules.

# 1.3.4 Use of non-approved spare parts

# 1.3.5 Unauthorised conversions

Do not make any changes (or otherwise manipulate the equipment in any way) that go beyond the handling described in these instructions; otherwise, the warranty will be voided. Follow the descriptions in the corresponding chapters of the operating and maintenance instructions when carrying out maintenance and servicing work. # 2.1 Personal injury



#### Danger to life due to electric shock!

The equipment is operated with electric current. The incorrect handling of the equipment, its connections and cables can lead to death or serious injury.

- Only connect the appliance to an earthed socket outlet that is protected by a residual current circuit breaker (RCD).
- Replace any damaged cables immediately.
- Do not use extension cables.
- Fix all cables to prevent damage being caused by other equipment.
- Before mounting the equipment or connecting it to a power supply, disconnect the relevant part of the system from the power supply.
- Only connect the device to the mains voltage as specified on the type plate.
- Route the connections for mains voltage and relay outputs separately.
- Only operate the equipment when the partition walls and terminal compartment cover are installed.

#### Risk of (chemical) burns from reagents!

# 2.2 Property damage

#### Avoiding interference voltages!

The Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN device requires stable and uninterrupted supply voltage.

- Where applicable, use a mains filter to shield the device from interference voltages.
- Never lay the connecting cables in parallel to mains cables.

# Handling may cause damage or destruction of electrical components!

If you have to open the equipment's top door, electrical components may be damaged or destroyed by electrostatic discharge.

- Take the necessary safety measures to avoid electrostatic discharge onto the components (ESD safety)
- Make sure you are earthed before opening the casing.

#### Measurement errors when using unapproved reagents!

The use of unapproved reagents can lead to large measurement deviations or measurement errors. Damage due to foreign particles affecting the dosing pumps, measuring chamber or valves is also possible. This can potentially invalidate the warranty!

 Only use original Heyl reagents that are specially adapted to the requirements for the measuring equipment, and thus guarantee perfect measuring results.

# 3.1 Available reagents

# 3.2 Other operational requirements

The following conditions must be ensured for a smooth operation:

- Only use Testomat<sup>®</sup> reagents.
- The pH range must be between 4 and 10.5.
- The water to be measured must be clean and free of bubbles!
- Only operate the device within the scope of parameters specified under chapter 3 <u>Technical Data</u> on page 6.
- In Testomat<sup>®</sup> instruments for monitoring calcium hardness, the ions of aluminium, barium, lead, iron, copper, manganese, strontium, zinc and tin can interfere with the recording during titration, or by blurring the colour change of the reagent.
- If the test water contains more than 20 mg/l CO<sub>2</sub> (carbonic acid), erroneous evaluations cannot be ruled out. In this case, use an irrigator (e.g. optional accessory from Gebr. Heyl).
- The concentrations of disruptive ingredients can be determined with colorimetric TESTOVAL<sup>®</sup> test kits from Gebr. Heyl.
- In the event of
  - o excessive carbonate hardness
  - o the presence of disinfecting agents
  - the presence of silicate (used to protect pipes), the measuring chamber may become soiled, which over time
  - may lead to erroneous evaluations.
- Careful handling of the device enhances the operational safety and the service life! With this in mind, perform a visual inspection of the device at regular intervals as follows:
  - Has the expiry date of the reagents elapsed?
  - o Are the hose connections of the dosing pump leakproof?
  - o Is there any air in the dosing hoses?
  - Are all water connections leakproof?
  - o Is the door of the device carefully closed?
  - Is the device excessively soiled?



- Are the measuring chamber and drain channel/drain hose clean?
- Problem-free operation is contingent on regular maintenance! Maintenance and care instructions can be found in the chapter 9 <u>Servicing and maintenance</u> on page 71.
- Indications of problems can be found in the chapter <u>Troubleshooting</u> and repair on page 62.

# 4.2 **Product description**

The scope of use of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN is the automatic determination and monitoring of the calcium hardness in water.

- Simplified menu-driven operation and programming via OLED
- Free selection of hardness units in °dH, °f, ppm and mmol/I
- Analysis trigger:
  - Automatic interval operation (Interval pause can be configured from 0-99 minutes)
  - o Depending on quantity, via contact water meter (see page 47)
  - External analysis stop and analysis start through combined start/stop input
- Two independent limit values with adjustable switch functions and switch option after adjustable number of bad analyses (Two neutral change-over contacts)
- Logging on SD card for measurement data and notifications/alarms with interim buffer for 100 measurement values and 50 notifications.
- Import and Export of settings (basic program data) with selectable filenames.
- Error history for 20 notifications
- Firmware update via SD card
- Built-in self-test with ongoing monitoring
- Features for integration into process controllers:
  - Fault signal output (neutral changeover contact) with clear input (External error acknowledgement)
  - 2 current interfaces 0/4 20 mA for the analogue transmission of measurement data of both measured values
  - Serial RS232 interface to transfer measurement data and notifications/alarms
  - Ethernet network connection with web server for graphic display of measured values and messages/alarms. Auto-MDI-X, this means that no crossover cable is required, even during direct connection to a PC network card.
  - Notification by e-mail of new measured values, alarms/messages and limit value violations
  - File download by browser or FTP.
  - Password protection for all settings, FTP and web access possible



# 4.3 Functions of the control and display elements

The operating modes and measurement values are shown on the display of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN The input keys for the programming (cursor block) and function keys are underneath the display.

# 4.3.1 Switching the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN on/off

#### Possible malfunction!

If the waiting time after switching off is too short, the equipment will not shut down completely, which may cause a malfunction.

• Wait at least five seconds after switching off before switching back on.

The Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN can be switched on or off via an external mains switch. Internal device fuses protect the equipment or the outputs from overload and short circuit. You will find a detailed description of the fuses in chapter 9.5 <u>Replacing fuses</u> on page 73. The article numbers for reordering fuses can be found in chapter 10.1 <u>Spare parts</u> on page 78.

# 4.3.2 Display functions

#### Display of the selected settings

If only one entry from a choice of multiple entries can be selected from within a menu, a \* symbol is shown. For all other entries, nothing is shown. If multiple entries from within a menu can be selected, a  $\sqrt{}$  is shown, or –, for each of the active settings.

If inputting numbers is possible, the cursor keys arrow **r/l** are used to change the position and the buttons arrows **u/d** to change the value. In all cases, an input must be confirmed with **OK** to be applied.



# 4.3.4 Meaning of the symbols in the menu

In the menu, symbols are shown on the first line at the right-hand edge. These represent the function keys, which can be used to facilitate navigation at this point in the menu.

# 4.5 Relay outputs

#### Danger of destruction due to excessive load!

The relay outputs are designed for a defined maximum load (see chapter 3 <u>Technical Data</u> on page 6).

- Note the load capacity of the relay outputs.
- Note the total load capacity.

All relay outputs are designed as neutral contacts. This means the full range of connection options is available to you. This facilitates the switching of mains power, external power and direct switching of inputs, e.g. a process control procedure is implemented.

Ensure that the maximum electrical load capacity of the switching outputs is not exceeded, particularly for inductive loads. The pow-er supply for the user inclusive device is secured with a 4A fuse, which means the total of all loads must not reach 4A.

See chapter 5.1.11 <u>Connect inputs and outputs</u> on page 31 for the terminal connection.

Further explanations can be found in chapter 6.11 <u>Set programmable</u> <u>switching output AUX</u> on page 46.

# 4.6 Signal inputs and signal outputs



#### Damage to the equipment due to external voltage!

Connecting the signal inputs with external voltage will damage the equipment.

 Only connect the signal inputs Stop, WM and ext. Delete with potential-free contacts!

The following signal inputs are available:

- Stop input
- External deletion
- Water meter input
- Measuring point switch-over
- Micro dosing pump

These can be activated individually (see chapter 6.17 <u>Set up signal inputs</u> and outputs on page 49).

#### 4.6.1 Stop input

The stop input is intended for short-term suspension of operation, e.g. when performing renewal work on softening plants, reverse osmosis or other water treatment systems. Generally speaking, the system is not offline for more than six hours. The renewal phase of a softening plant, for example, lasts three hours at most.

If stop input is active, an analysis is prevented from starting, due for example to an interval having elapsed. This may be required, if the system lacks water. However, any analysis already started will not be suspended. The analysis is completed, and the device reverts to pause mode.

Manual start has priority over stop input. That means that manual analysis can still be started even when stop input is active. While the stop signal is present, the measurement value is shown on the display and the LED pause flashes. If the stop signal is deleted, a new analysis starts immediately. Accordingly, a short impulse on the stop input can help trigger an analysis remotely.

The "Measuring point" input is only queried if, under the basic program menu Measuring points the function 2 measuring points via input is activated (see chapter 6.14 <u>Measuring points</u> on page 47). Otherwise, the switching is controlled via the menu.

If the input is active, measuring point 1 is measured, if the input is inactive, measuring point 2 is measured.

# 4.7 Current interface 0/4 – 20 mA

#### Damage to the equipment due to overloading of the interfaces!

Overloading the interfaces can cause damage to the equipment.

- Do not exceed a load of 500 ohms.
- In the event of faults and very long lines (around 20 m), the use of shielded cable is possible.

# 4.7.1 Calculation of output currents

Depending on the selected function, the current range available is either 0 - 20 mA or 4 - 20 mA. The resulting currents for the various measurement values are shown in the form of the following formulas.

# 4.8 Serial interface

The serial interface transfers measurement data and alarms/notifications in plain text/ASCII in CSV format. It is always active. It can be switched to RS232 or network by means of a jumper (see chapter 7 <u>Connect to network</u> on page 52).

The recovery setting is only needed if the Ethernet converter is not accessible via network. In recovery mode, the setting is made via the RS232 connection with the *DeviceInstaller* software from a PC.

The default setting is RS232. The Ethernet converter is inactive.

Via the serial interface, data is sent in the format 8 bit, 1 stop bit, no parity.

As soon as a new measured value has been determined, it is transmitted immediately.



The baud rate can be set to 2400, 9600, 19200, 38400 and 115200 baud. For Ethernet, 9600 must be set!

Alarms are transmitted via the serial interface, In the case of alarms that cannot be acknowledged because the device generates them automatically, the end of the alarm is also reported (alarm inactive). These are messages from the SD card or the optics. See chapter 8.4 <u>Troubleshooting and repair</u> on page 62.

#### Notification format

The notifications are sent in a very similar format as the data placed on the SD card. For connection to a PC a so-called null modem cable is required. The message format is as follows:

- The headings are not transmitted
- Field separator is a comma
- Decimal separator is a full stop
- Each data set is started with the ASCII characters "02" <STX> and terminated with "03" <ETX>.
- Notifications and measured values can be distinguished by evaluating the first characters: If "ME" is read, it is a measured value; with "AL", it is an alarm/notification.
- This corresponds to the format of the Testomat 2000<sup>®</sup> data logger.

# 4.9 Description of the SD card functions

The SD card can be used to record measurement values and errors as well as for importing and exporting the device settings. Error and measurement value files are separately placed in subfolders arranged by year and month:

In the year folder, files including measurement values and errors are arranged by month.

The format of the file names is: ME<Year><Month>.csv for measurement values and

AL<Year><Month>.csv for errors/alarms.

In the year folders, as required, subfolders are placed for the 12 months of the year, within each of which a file for measurement values and errors per day is placed.

The format of the filenames is ME<Year><Month><Day>.csv for measurement values and AL<Year><Month><Day>.csv for errors/alarms.

Data is stored in the "Comma-Separated-Value" format, to facilitate inclusion in spreadsheet programs and to allow it to be easily imported into databases.

To ensure that the naming of the file and the time and date details in the file are correct, the time function must work properly. If the battery drains, the date is automatically set to 1.1.2011, 12:00 and the data is stored. Data is not lost, since new measurement values and errors are appended to existing files. However, only one file is de-scribed in each case, since the month and day are not subject to change.

#### Interim storage for a non-inserted SD card

Even if no SD card is currently inserted, no measurement values and errors are lost, since the most recently error and measurement values, which have not yet been written into storage, are saved on internal interim storage (ring memory). The capacity of this interim buffer is 50 error and 100 measurement values. After this point, the oldest values will be overwritten.

As soon as an SD card is inserted, the interim stored data is trans-mitted during next write operation.

#### Capacity of the SD card

The storage requirement for 10,000 measurement values amounts to around 1 MByte. If error messages occur for one percent of the measurement values, a 2 GB SD card for example may have around 19 million measurement values and errors.

#### Basic programming data on the SD card

You can save the settings for the equipment in a file on the SD card. This function is recommended for:

Storing multiple configuration profiles for one device



- Transferring settings onto other devices
- Configuring multiple devices with identical settings
- Remote maintenance / support via transfer of the basic programming data

The filename is preset to "bdata00.ini" (for "Basic Data" / basic programming data). The digits are adjustable, meaning that in total 100 different files from "bdata00.ini" up to "bdata99.ini" can be selected. The files are always stored in the root directory of the SD card.

The settings are in the file in text form and can be displayed or edit-ed, with for example the notepad application on a PC.

If an error message occurs during the import, the format of the data is defective. This may occur if the file has been edited. In this case no settings are changed. Use a simple text editor for editing (e.g. WordPad), not a word processor, since otherwise the formatting may be changed!

# 5 Prepare the product for use

# 5.1 Installation

# 5.1.1 Remove the packaging material

Remove the packaging material completely before starting assembly.

Separate packaging materials according to type and size and send for further use or recycling if no other arrangements have been made with your distributor.

# 5.1.2 Delivery includes

1 Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN

4 Screw caps including hole and an insert for the screw cap of the reagent bottles

1 Drain funnel

1 User manual

# 5.1.3 Requirements for the installation site

Ensure that the following conditions are met at the installation site:

- Use the device in indoor locations only.
- The ambient temperature is between 10 and 40°C.
- The installation site is at altitudes under 2000 m.
- The maximum relative humidity is 80% at temperatures of up to 31°C (linear declining up to 50% relative humidity at 40°C).
- The device must always be protected against wetness and moisture. Under no circumstances may it be exposed to splashed water or condensate.
- Surge category II
- Soiling degree II

# 5.1.4 Assemble equipment

#### Interrupted operation due to faulty assembly!

In the event of faulty assembly, trouble-free operation is not guaranteed.

- Assemble the device in a location shielded from drips and splashes of water, dust and aggressive substances.
- Assemble the device vertically.
- Assemble the device without mechanical stresses.
- Assemble the device in a location free of vibration.
- Select an installation site at which the length of the water inlet hose can be minimized (max. 5 m)

# NOTE





#### Jamming of the cores with incorrectly selected cross-section!

If cores with the wrong cross-section are used, there is a risk of them becoming jammed when they are released from the terminal strip.

• Our recommendation to prevent jamming is, that you only use wires with cross-sections greater than 0.5 mm<sup>2</sup>.

#### Danger of kinking and abrasion with the cables!

If the wrong cable glands are used, cables may kink or rub.

- Use M16 cable glands.
- Use cable glands with a smooth and rounded opening.
- Ensure that the bend protection is reliably fixed and is five times the maximum cable diameter.
- Use a cable gland with a strain relief that prevents the cable from slipping and cannot be loosened without the aid of tools.
- Use cable glands made of a material with a flammability classification of V1 or better.

You can order cable ducts from us as spare parts (see <u>chapter 10.1</u> <u>Spare parts</u> on page 78).

During assembly and commissioning, observe the specific nation-al and local requirements.

Observe the accident prevention and conservation requirements in the country of use and at the installation site.

Proceed as follows when assembling the equipment:

- 1. Leave sufficient room on the left side of the device to open the door.
- 2. Drill the mounting holes as specified in figure 7.
- 3. Secure the device with three screws in a suitable place in the switching cabinet or on the wall.







# 5.1.5 Assembly of the micro-dosing pump on the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN

#### Damage to the pump caused by dust!

No dust is allowed to get into the pump because the threaded rod of the micro-dosing pump is greased.

• Always keep the micro-dosing pump closed after assembly.

The micro dosing pump is dismantled before shipping to avoid damage. Therefore, it must be mounted on the Testomat<sup>®</sup> Pro Ca before it is put into operation. Proceed as follows:

- 1. Place the micro dosing pump on the left side of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> Pro Ca so that the screw bolts and the tube fitting are adjusted.
- 2. Place the wing nuts with the washers on the screw bolts and tighten them until hand-tight.
- Screw the tubes into the tube fitting. Make sure that the tube "A" marked with cable marker in the pump is screwed to the tube "A" inside.
- 4. Open the cover and mount the cables. There are 2 cables, one threepole and one two-pole (see Figure 8).



The pump is fully assembled.

Vent the pump as described in Chapter 6.23 <u>Venting the MicroClip dosing</u> pump on page 51.

# 5.1.6 Connecting the water intake

#### Damage due to measuring water that is too warm!

Water above 40°C can cause burns and damage to the parts of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO CA that come into contact with water.

- The measurement water temperature must be between 10 and 40°C.
- Install a cooler in the intake when the water temperature is above 40°C.

#### Interrupted operation if operating conditions are incorrect!

The following conditions must be fulfilled for the equipment's proper operation:

- The water pressure must be within the range 0.3 to 8 bar.
- To operate within a pressure range of 0.3 to 1 bar or when supplying via a booster pump, remove the controller core from the controller and filter housing. The pump should have a capacity of 25 to 35 liters/hour and be correspondingly resistant to the medium being measured.
- For pressures below 0.3 bar or for suction from a tank, use our booster pump MepuClip<sup>®</sup> (Art. No. 270410).
- Use a pressure reducer when operating above 8 bar.
- Avoid significant pressure fluctuations.
- We recommend short intake lines (under 3m) to the device. For intake lines longer than 3 m, purge periods of longer than 10 s must be configured. For cable lengths exceeding 5 – 10 m, we recommend external flushing via the AUX input.

#### Use within a pressure range of 0.3 to 1 bar

When delivered, the device is equipped for a pressure range of 1 to 8 bar. To operate the device within a pressure range of 0.3 to 1 bar, the flow governor core should be removed. Proceed as follows. Use Figure Figure 9 as a guide.

- 5. Take the locking pin (3) from the controller/filter housing (4).
- 6. Pull the controller plug (1) on the metal brackets out of the drill hole.
- 7. Remove the flow governor core (2).
- 8. Re-insert the controller plug (1).
- 9. Re-insert the locking pin (3).

The test water is extracted from the sampling pipe and channelled to the supply nozzles of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN The device comes with a plug connection for plastic hoses 6/4 x 1 as standard (external diameter 6 mm/ internal diameter 4 mm, wall thickness 1 mm).

Connect the water inlet as follows:

- 1. Connect the linking piece for the intake of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN directly to the sampling pipe (1) directly behind the water treatment plant.
- 2. Always establish the connection vertically upwards, to prevent dirt particles from being conveyed from the sampling pipe to the device.
- 3. Assemble a manual stop valve (2) in the intake to the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN.
- For the water intake (3) use opaque plastic pressure hose 6/4 x 1 (max. length 5 m)
- 5. Purge the intake to remove dirt particles.

# 5.1.7 Connecting the water drain

The water is conveyed through the measuring chamber via an open funnel (6) and the drain hose installed on the same and into the duct.

Connect the water outlet as follows:

- 1. Remove the supplied funnel (6) and accommodate it underneath, in the recess of the housing designated for that purpose.
- Connect the funnel of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN with a drain hose (4) (internal diameter 12 mm/14 mm)
- 3. Lay this hose free of back pressure and without the siphon effect to the drain (5).

# 5.1.8 Expose cable bushing

To guarantee IP protection, the device is supplied with cable ductings and blanking plugs. If you wish to use a relay output, you must remove the blanking plug from the cable ducting. Proceed as follows in this instance:

- 1. Loosen the strain relief of the cable ducting (union nut).
- 2. Take out the blanking plug (1) and insert the cable.
- 3. Tighten the union nut of the cable ducting and so establish the strain relief.

# 5.1.9 Connect mains voltage

#### Danger to life due to missing emergency stop switch!

There is a danger to life in the event of contact with a live component. When delivered, the equipment does not have a mains switch with which you can quickly disconnect it from the mains.

- Fit the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN with a switch as a disconnecting device for the power supply.
- Use an appliance switch or a circuit breaker that meets the requirements of IEC 60947-1 and IEC 60947-3.
  - The switch must be within easy reach of the user of the device.
- The switch must be clearly marked as a disconnecting device for the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN
- You can also provide for a socket near the equipment for disconnection, into which a cable (with a suitable plug) is plugged in. Clearly mark the cable as a disconnecting device for the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO CA SELF CLEAN.
- Water conducts electricity and runs downwards. Therefore, always lay all power lines higher than water lines!

#### Danger to life due to electric shock!

Cables with dangerous voltages are connected in the terminal compartment, which cause a life-threatening electric shock if touched.

• Be sure to replace the terminal compartment cover after connecting the system components and mains voltage.

#### Risk of injury from assembly when voltage present!

You risk injury, unless you disconnect the power supply before commencing assembly.

- Disconnect all power to the relevant system component before assembling the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO CA SELF CLEAN.
- Close all taps in the vicinity of the Testomat PRO Ca SELF CLEAN and secure them against being opened accidentally. It is essential to avoid any and all contact between power lines and water!

# NOTE

NOTE

#### Damage from assembly when voltage present!

You risk destruction of the product or damage to system components, unless you disconnect the power supply before commencing assembly.

• Disconnect all power to the relevant system component before assembling the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN.

#### Damage possible due to the use of incorrect cables and pipes!

Use only cables and installed lines which meet the following requirements:

- Dielectric strength 30 V ... 260 V according to the nominal voltage (see specification plate).
- The cable ducts installed by Gebr. Heyl in the device have a clamping range of 4.5 mm 10 mm. This means that the external diameter of the laid cable must remain within the range of 4.5 mm 10 mm.







- If you use other ducts, the cable diameters must correspond to the ducts.
- The terminal strips on the circuit board require core crosssections of between 0.08 mm<sup>2</sup> and 2.5 mm<sup>2</sup> according to the manufacturer. This applies to single-wire and fine-wire cores with wire end ferrules without plastic collar.
- For fine-wire cores with wire end ferrules and plastic collar, the cross-section may be up to 1.5 mm<sup>2</sup>.
- For single-wire cores, AWG28 AWG12 can also be used.

#### Danger of damage due to electromagnetic fields!

If you assemble the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN device or connecting cables parallel to mains cables or in the vicinity of strong electromagnetic fields, the device may be damaged or the measurement disrupted.

- Keep the connecting cables as short as possible.
- Lay the connecting cables and mains cables separately.
- Connect the device with the protective conductor (at 230/100-240 VAC).
- Keep interference voltages away from the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN device – e.g. by using a mains filter.
- Shield the device from strong electromagnetic fields.

#### Damage to cables and restricted equipment function!

If the cables are kinked when the terminal cover is replaced, damage to the cable may occur and the equipment's function may be restricted.

• Do not pinch the cables when installing the terminal compartment cover.

Connect the device only to the mains voltage for which it is de-signed. See type plate to confirm the suitable mains voltage.

To connect the cable, proceed as described below. Use Figure 12 as a guide.

- 1. Remove both fixing screws (2).
- 2. Open the upper door.
- 3. Remove the fixing screws of the terminal cover and then remove the terminal cover itself.
- 4. Lay the cable through the cable ducting (1) provided for that purpose.
- 5. Tighten the union nut of the cable ducting and so establish the strain relief.
- 6. Connect the supply voltage to the terminals PE, N, L or, for 24 V devices, to U and V terminals.
- 7. Ensure that the cores in the terminals are securely in place.
- 8. Install the terminal compartment cover.

#### Danger to life due to electric shock!

If you connect system components that do not operate using the device voltage, you can apply external voltages to the relay contacts. This external voltage cannot be switched off via the external mains switch.

• Put a warning sign on the equipment (e. g. a sticker like in Figure 13).

To connect the plant components, proceed as follows: (Illustrated position of relays: Device without current, mains: 230 V)

- 1. Take out the blanking plugs of the corresponding cable ductings.
- 2. Push through the cable of the component.
- 3. Tighten the union nut of the cable ducting.
  - The strain relief is restored.
- 4. Connect the system components to the output terminals of relays 1 to 4 (e.g. valves).
- 5. If the system components require mains power, connect the external switched mains voltage (I) to the root contact (1) of the respective relay (see connection example in figure 15.
- 6. Connect the neutral conductor of the system component with one of the terminals (n).



- 7. For components with a protective conductor connection, connect them to the PE connection.
- 8. Ensure that the cores in the terminals are securely in place.

### 5.1.12 Connect current interface





The plug-in card provides two (including opposed) potential-separated 20mA current outputs, as well as an additional RS232 interface, which is used to control the micro dosing pump mounted on the side.

The load must not exceed 500 Ohm. The maximum voltage between I10UT+ and I10UT- or I20UT+ and I20UT- is 12V.

### 5.1.13 Insert SD card

#### 5.2 Commissioning

#### 5.2.1 Insert reagent bottle

### WARNING

Insert the reagent bottle as follows. Consider figure 19.

- 1. Open the lower housing door by pulling on the right side.
- 2. Remove the closing cap of the reagent bottle.
- 3. Remove the plastic bag from the inner side of the lower housing door. It contains the screw cap with hole (1) and the insert (2) for the screw cap.
- 4. Join the parts together as shown on the left side. Note the correct assignment of the reagents to the pumps and their tube markers:

Testomat Calcium Reagent A = Tube marker A to the micro dosing pump Testomat Calcium Reagent B = Tube marker B to DosiClip pump Testomat Calcium Reagent C = Tube marker C to PeriClip pump Testomat cleaning solution = Tube marker D to FlowClip pump

- 5. Screw the hose connector (3) of the suction hose (4) hand-tight into the insert (2).
- 6. Plug the insert with screwed-in suction hose into the reagent bottle.
- 7. Now screw the screw cap with hole (1) hand-tight onto the reagent bottle (5).
- 8. Switch on the equipment and press Pause.
- 9. Enter the filling levels of all reagent bottles in %: Select the menu >SERVICE => REAGENT => Adjust to 100% (New/full bottle = 100% filling level)
- 10. Confirm the input with the button **OK**.
- 11. Enter the other filling levels accordingly.

Watch out for air bubbles in the tubes as they can lead to incorrect measurements. If there is an air bubble in the tube, it must be vented.

12. To do this, press the Manual button on the pump or select the appropriate pump in the "Service" menu under SERVICE => DIAGNOSIS => DosiClip/PeriClip/FlowClip to initiate a pumping process. With the micro dosing pump, the cover can also be removed and the pump can be moved manually with the pushbutton switches (see chapter 4.10 Operating elements of the MicroClip micro dosing pump on page 21).

### 5.2.2 Open water intake

To open the water inlet, carry out the following steps. Refer to figure 20.

- 1. Open the lower housing lid.
- 2. Slowly open the manual stop valve to prevent the measuring chamber from overflowing. Configuring the flow regulator will take some time during the initial commissioning.
- 3. Check the leakproof quality of water-conveying parts.
- 4. If any water sprays out of the hose (2) of the measuring chamber (1), restrict the water intake to some extent with the manual stop valve. The measuring chamber should be filled within two to six seconds!

Before you start with the analysis, enter your desired program data as described in chapter 6 Instrument setting and data entry on page 36.

### 5.2.3 Operation after idle times

When switching on the device after idle times, check whether all tubes are filled with reagents, especially with Testomat Calcium Reagent B (with tube marking B), whose tubes are connected to the DosiClip pump. If this is not the case, press the **manual** button on the DosiClip pump until the reagent in the tubing reaches the measuring chamber. This avoids measurement errors during the first measurement after switching on.

### 6 Instrument setting and data entry

In chapter 4.3 <u>Functions of the control and display elements</u> on page 11 the operating elements and displays required for the equipment settings are explained.

### 6.1 Enter program values

Since no settings in the programming menu can be configured while the analysis is underway, press the **Pause** button once the venting is complete or proceed to the programming menu before the first analysis starts.



 Access the programming menu with the M key. Press this key in the menu to go to the superordinate menu item or to exit the program menu.

Make the following settings, since these are imperative for obtaining usable measurement values:

- Checking the date and time. This is important, in order that logged measured values and alarms are displayed at the correct time.
- Select the display unit of the measured values (see chapter 6.8 Select measurement value unit on page 44)
- Select operating mode. As a rule, the measurement is carried out at regular time intervals; therefore, select time-controlled

Perform the first measurement by pressing the **Manual** button. Upon completion of the analysis, a measurement value must be shown. If any error occurs, refer to the section on chapter 6.4 <u>Troubleshooting and</u> <u>repair</u> on page 62 and resolve the error.

Once the first analysis has been successfully completed, you can adapt the device to your desired usage. The following sections will set out all the configuration options.

### 6.1.1 Structure of the Service menu

Use the cursor keys to select the menu option Service. The following settings can be determined in the "Service" menu: Reset the reagent fill level, language setting, diagnosis, time, operating time, view/reset error history, cleaning measuring chamber (see figure 21)

#### Reagent (3)

Input the new fill level for each refill or when changing the bottle of the reagent. If you select the menu item for the filling level entry Reagent with **OK**, you can select the reagent that was switched out. If you have connected a full bottle, confirm this value with **OK**. If the bottle filling deviates from this, enter the corresponding value.



#### Language (4)

Select the desired language for the display.

#### Diagnosis (5)

The diagnosis menu allows you to perform an automatic comparison for the amplifier of the receiver diode and the LEDs. You can also switch and reset EV, AV and all outputs as well as test the current loop.

Under item Current output 1/2 4 mA the current interfaces can be checked. Press the **OK** button to switch between minimum and maximum current. With 0-20 mA, there is a change between 00 mA and 20 mA!

Under Pump1/2/3 the pumps can be controlled manually, e.g. for venting the lines.

#### Time and date (6)

To set the time, date and summertime adjustment (see chapter 6.3 <u>Set</u> <u>Date and Time</u> on page 41).

#### Operating time (7)

After replacing a dosing pump or mounting the measuring chamber, you can reset the current operating time with Reset to 0 hours.

#### Error history (8)

Faults are recorded in the error history and stored if the incident is programmed as an alarm or message. If for example the lack of reagent is not programmed to trigger an alarm/message, this is also not registered in the error history. Up to 20 error messages are recorded. The information stored in each case includes the point in time (day, month, year and time) and the type of error.

#### Cleaning (9)

Start cleaning the measuring chamber with the Self-Clean solution. The measuring chamber fills with cleaning solution and stays in the measuring chamber for the set application time. The measuring chamber is then rinsed.

The cleaning settings are described in the chapter 6.22 <u>Cleaning function</u> on page 51.

#### Venting the MicroClip (10)

This function is used to vent the micro-dosing pump during commissioning.

### 6.1.2 Structure of the Information menu i

Select the information menu by pressing **i**. In this menu, you can query the current settings and states of the equipment. The following query options are available: Operating and program values, such as software status, operating mode, maintenance/operating hours counter (see figure 22).

### Call (1)

The button i allows you to call up the information menu.

#### Next measurement (2)

Display showing the time remaining before the next measurement.

#### Software version (3)

Display showing the installed software version.

#### Bootloader version (4)

Display showing the in-stalled bootloader version. The bootloader is needed to execute the firmware update.

#### Serial number (5)

Display showing the serial number of the device.

#### Operating time (6)

Display showing the operating time of the device. Can be reset in the service menu.

### 6.1.3 Structure of the basic program

Select the menu item Basic program. Here you can implement the basic programming of the device (see figure 23).

In basic programming, the following abbreviations are used in the corresponding menu options:

s = seconds; m = minutes; h = hours; T = days; I = liters

#### 6.2 Set up password protection

Danger of changing settings, measurement data and web pages!

When accessing via network: The settings of the equipment cannot be changed remotely. However, changed measured values or websites can be uploaded by unauthorised persons over FTP or the web.

We recommend that you leave the password protection activated.

Independently thereof, a four-digit password can be set in the Basic Program on the equipment for data entry and settings. If you have have forgotten your password, contact your Heyl service partner or water supplier. Note that in exporting settings, the password is not saved. Set your desired password as follows:

- 6. Move with the **arrows r/l** to the desired position in the time/date field.
- 7. Select the desired figure by confirming with the arrows u/d.

- 9. Press the **M** button to leave the levels.
  - The date and time are now set. The clock continues to run even if the device is switched off.

The function is used to adjust the internal clock offset in the range of a few minutes per month.

- 10. After you have set the clock for the first time, check the offset after one month.

### 6.4 Select Language

You have the choice between the languages English, German (default setting) and French.

### 6.5 Setup OLED

The Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN is equipped with a large-surface OLED graphic display with a service life of more than 20 years at a setting of 50% luminosity. Set up the display as follows:

- Adjust brightness in the menu: Basic program => OLED Settings => Brightness
  - While you are changing a setting, it is accepted directly in the display for preview, but is not yet saved
- 2. Set the brightness in standby mode in the menu: Basic program => OLED Settings => Brightness in standby This screensaver extends the life of the LEDs many times over.
- 3. Select the time in minutes until standby: Basic program => OLED Settings => Time to standby
- 4. Press **OK**, to confirm the settings.

### 6.6 Select operating mode

Under the menu option Operating mode you can select the type of analytical control. The Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN gives you scope to control timing or quantity via water meter.

The analysis interval (interval between two analyses) is determined by the configured purge cycle, the programmed pause time (interval) and the duration of analysis. The duration of analysis is directly dependent on the measurement value.

#### Select timing control

- Select in the menu Basic program=> Mode of operation => Time controlled.
- 2. Confirm the selection with OK.
  - An \* appears at the end of the line.
     The factory default is Time controlled.
- Enter the interval (see chapter 6.7 <u>Configure interval pause</u> on page 43).

#### Select quantity control

Smallest interval = 1 liter, largest interval = 9999 liters. The analysis is performed once the programmed quantity of water has passed. Before the analysis, the line and measuring chamber are purge. Observe programmed purge cycles.

- Select in the menu Basic program => Mode of operation => Volume interval.
- 2. Confirm the selection with OK.
  - > An \* appears at the end of the line.
- 3. Select in the menu Basic program => Interval => Volume.
- 4. Confirm the selection with OK.
- 5. Input the corresponding flow volume in liters.
- 6. Confirm the input with OK.
- 7. Now select the water meter (see page 47).

### 6.7 Configure interval pause

With time-controlled analysis trigger, the interval between two analyses is determined by the interval pause (plus purge cycle). The shortest possible interval pause is 0 minutes. Non-stop analyses are then performed. The largest interval is 99 minutes. The time for the analysis interval comprises the cumulative time taken for the "Analysis interval", "Flush" and the duration of analysis, which depends on the measurement value (see Figure 24). When you perform additional purging via the AUX relay before or after the analysis, the duration of the analysis interval will be extended accordingly.

- Select in the menu Basic program => Interval => Pause time.
- 2. Select the pause time in minutes with the cursor keys. The factory default setting is 10 minutes.
- 3. Confirm all entries with OK.

### 6.8 Select measurement value unit

You can program the unit of the value shown. Your selection options include °dH and °f. All the following inputs and displays will then be shown in the programmed unit.

- 1. Select in the menu Basic program=> Unit.
- Select the desired unit The factory default setting is the °dH unit.
- 3. Confirm the selection with OK.

### 6.9 Set limit value monitoring

You can program the limit values to be stepless. The limit value range is specified by the reagent type and programmed unit used. You can monitor two limit values. For this purpose, each limit value output is available. The functions of the assigned delay outputs can be programmed independently of each other. The limit value outputs are permanently assigned to limit values! GW1/2 are available on the LV1/2 terminals. If the limit value LV1 is exceeded, the limit value control indicator lights up in RED and the relay output LV1 responds according to the programmed switching function. If the limit value has not been exceeded, the indicator lights up in GREEN. The same functional approach applies to the limit value LV2.

### Entering the limit values

- 1. Select in the menu Basic program => limit values.
- 2. Input the values for LV 1 or LV 2.
- 3. Confirm the input with **OK**.

# 6.10 Input operating mode of LV1 and LV2 limit value outputs

#### Note the setting ranges for LV1 and LV2!

The setting range of LV1 is at most the value of LV2. LV2 must always be greater than LV1.

- Always change LV2 before setting LV1!
- Activate the operating mode for both relays via Basic program => Function LV1/LV2.

The following operating modes can be configured:

- Limit value: A limit value can be defined for both relays. The relays switch when the limit value is exceeded.
- Two-point: Relay LV1 behaves as with limit value.
   Relay LV2 behaves like a two-point controller: If the upper limit value LV2 is exceeded, output relay LV2 switches. If the value falls below the lower limit value LV1, relay LV2 drops out again. This "dead zone" between LV1 and LV2 is the hysteresis.



Range: Relays switch when leaving the preset range between LV1 and LV2: If the value falls below LV1, relay LV1 switches and the LED "LV1" lights up red. If LV2 is exceeded, relay 2 switches and LED LV2 lights up red. Within the range between LV1 and LV2, the LEDs light up green.

The following diagram illustrates the different switching functions. The switching status, which is indicated by the LV LEDs, is shown as a function of the selected switching function and the measured value:

### 6.10.1 Switching functions, multiple limit value exceedance

You have the following setting options:

- Deactivated: the relay does not switch
- Active Before retry: In this case the relay AUX e.g. is used to control an external purge valve. If a limit value has been exceeded, but the number set for the limit value occurrences was >1, the relay switches before each measurement is repeated. The purge procedure is performed for the set time. This can help prevent measurement errors due to insufficient purging.
- Active Before analysis: e.g. for external purging switches the relay for the set time before each analysis.

### 6.12 Input flush time

To guarantee that the sample being analysed is current, the sampling line must be sufficiently flushed over its entire length. When the system is unused for an extended period and when the analysis interval is considerable, a flush time of more than 60 seconds should be selected. The flushing is performed by simultaneously opening the inlet and outlet valves of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN The analysis interval depends directly on the programmed flush time. If for example a flush time of 90 seconds is set, the analysis interval must be at least 90 seconds as well.

### 6.14 Measuring points

The unit can record 2 measuring points, one after the other. Just how this is done is set in this menu item:

- 1. Select from menu Basic program => Measuring points
  - One measuring point: Only measuring point 1 is measured, the assigned current output is OUT1.
  - Two measuring points alternating: Measuring point 1 and then measuring point 2 are measured alternately.
  - Two measuring points via input. The input MP1 determines the selection of the measuring point: If the input is inactive, measuring point 1 is measured, if the input is active (shortcircuited), measuring point 2 is measured.
- 2. Confirm the entry by pressing OK.

### 6.15 Set dosing of reagent B

In the standard setting, reagent B is dosed into the measuring chamber with 3 strokes. The dosage can be reduced to 2 strokes if very clean water with low calcium content (e.g. no or only few interfering ions) is analysed.

If the error message Meas fault pH is displayed during a measurement with 3 strokes, change to the setting 0.06ml / 2 strokes.

### 6.16 Program alarm (Fault signal output)

The device includes a relay Alarm output to notify faults. A error is signalled via the LED alarm and the corresponding error message is shown on the display. You can configure whether and how this indicator should be shown.

- 1. Select the menu Basic program => Alarm/Message.
- 2. Select the signalling for each type of error.

You can set whether the error alerts

- are not provided at all (by selecting in the menu).
   Note: selection is not always available!
- Only in the display (by selecting M for notification/message)
- In the display and via the relay output (by selecting A for Alarm)

#### Functions of the alarm output

The Alarm output is an isolated relay changeover contact. During faultfree operation, the relay is energised, and the contact is closed. In the event of a voltage breakdown, the contact is open.

The device includes a whole range of monitoring functions with following functions/performance of the Alarm output:

In the event of permanent contact, the output remains "Alarm" indefinitely activated (terminals 10 - 12 closed), pending resolution of the error. The prerequisite here is that, in the menu Basic program =>

Alarm/Message the signalling A indicating the alarm for this error type is activated.

The fault signal at the Alarm output is stopped when you acknowledge the error with the **Alarm** button or by entering EXT. ACK. With the help of these inputs and outputs and the transmission of measurement data (via 20mA current loop or serial RS232 interface), the Testomat can be operated at a master display.

If the limit value is exceeded, there is *no* additional Alarm via the Fault signal output!

A description of the possible causes of error is included in the section in chapter 8.4 <u>Troubleshooting and repair</u> on page 62.

### 6.22 Cleaning function

#### Damage to the components due to incorrect dosing!

Components in the device can be damaged by a wrong dosage or incorrect cleaning solutions!

- Observe the information in the safety data sheet when using the cleaning agent.
- Do not dispense cleaning solution by hand.
- Only use cleaning solution that has been approved by Gebr. Heyl.

By selecting Clean the measuring chamber is first rinsed and then the agent is added to the water in the measuring chamber After the set application time, the contents of the measuring chamber are drained. The measuring chamber is then rinsed twice. In order to achieve an optimal cleaning result, we recommend using Testomat<sup>®</sup> cleaning solution, as described in chapter10.3. <u>Consumables</u> on page 79.

The function is used to automatically determine the optimum pump running time to completely fill the measuring chamber. This means that the optimum amount of cleaning solution is dispensed.

Adjust the settings as follows:

- 1. In the menu, select Basic program => Cleaning.
- 2. Under , select the quantity after which cleaning should take place. Cleaning the measuring chamber with the Self-Clean solution can be set after 1-99 analyses
- 3. Under Cleaning time select the cleaning duration in minutes.
- 4. Use to start determining the optimum pump running time.
  - > The pump running time in seconds is displayed
- 5. Start the cleaning of the measuring chamber with Clean.

### 6.23 Venting the MicroClip dosing pump

Vent the micro-dosing pump during commissioning.

- 1. In the menu, select .
- 2. Press
  - > The MicroClip pump starts pumping.
- 3. Let the pump run until the reagent pumps into the measuring chamber without bubbles.
- 4. Press again to stop the pump.

### 7 Connect to network

#### No network with incorrect setting on the control board

In order for the data of the serial interface to be passed on to the network module, the correct setting of the plug-in field on the control board is necessary.

 Determine the settings as described in chapter <u>Serial interface</u> on page 18.

A network connection is not necessary for the operation of Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN

With a connection, you have the possibility to retrieve your measurement data as well as error and alarm messages via browser or e-mail. The necessary steps for setting up and operating the network can be found in this chapter.

The menu and path information in this chapter (e.g. Send e-mail) refers to the DeviceInstaller software and the display in the browser, not to the menu of the Testomat equipment.

#### Status displays

The two LEDs on the network connector indicate a connection after a network cable has been plugged in:

### 7.1 Perform network settings

The following are described in the settings process:

#### Password protection

The web interface of the Ethernet converter and the FTP access are password-protected ex works:

- User "admin"
- Password "PASS".

Some data must be known about the network into which the network logger will be integrated.

#### 7.1.1 Checklist for network configuration:

1. Allocation of IP addresses in the network

#### a) IP addresses are assigned via DHCP

This corresponds to the state on delivery; no settings are required.

52



Often the IP address can be linked to a MAC address by the server so that the device is always reachable under the same IP address. The MAC address is printed on the module with the network connection under the barcode.

#### b) No, a static IP address is used

The network logger must be assigned a fixed IP address, network mask (and possibly gateway). This is done with the DeviceInstaller software. The procedure is explained in detail in Lantronix User's Guide chapter 3 "Using DeviceInstaller".

If the DeviceInstaller does not work over the network, the network logger can also be connected using RS232 (see\_chapter 4.8 <u>Serial interface</u> on page 18). To do this, proceed as described in the chapter on troubleshooting and problem solving (see Lantronix manual).

2. Which options should be active for data access?

#### a) FTP for file transfer of measurement/alarm data in CSV format

FTP access is active in the delivery state. It can be switched off in the configuration menu under  $FTP \rightarrow Configuration \rightarrow State$ Disabled and activated with Enabled.

Assign usernames and passwords to limit access so that only authorised personnel can log in.

#### b) E-mail for notifications of new measurements or alarms:

Determine the e-mail settings under Configuration  $\rightarrow$  Email1..3 as well as Protocol Stack  $\rightarrow$  SMTP.

Setting the priority to Very Low will turn e-mails off, all other priorities will turn it on.

The settings can be checked with Send Email. An e-mail is generated as a test.

The setting Email 4 is not used. It can, for example, be used to send a complete file via e-mail!

#### c) Web browser for online display and data analysis

Web access is active in the delivery state. It should not be turned off as then there will be no options for settings!

Assign usernames and passwords to limit access so that only authorised personnel can log in.

This data is entered under <code>HTTP</code>  $\rightarrow$  Authentication  $\rightarrow$  Username, Password.

d) Web browser for file transfer of measurement/alarm data in CSV format: The measurement/alarm files can be downloaded via the web interface under the menu Filesystem→ Browse. All data for one month is stored in the folder http, subfolder for the corresponding year.

Assign usernames and passwords to limit access so that only authorised personnel can log in.



This data is entered under HTTP  $\rightarrow$  Authentication  $\rightarrow$  Username, Password.

#### Should access be limited by using passwords?

**Yes:** Separate passwords can be configured for FTP and web access, see 2a and 2c below.

**No:** Delete the passwords for FTP and web access, see 2a and 2c below.

### 7.2 Web interface configuration menus

#### <u>Status</u>

Ethernet converter status

#### <u>Line</u>

The settings relate to the serial interface. Baud rate, data bits and stop bits must not be changed!

#### **Network**

Basic network settings such as DHCP, IP address, gateway, host name.

#### Protocol Stack

The setting of the SMTP Relay is important if e-mails are to be sent.

#### <u>SSH</u>

Access via Secure Shell. Not necessary here.

#### <u>SSL</u>

The encryption of data transfer over the web. Includes certificate production. Is not required for function; relevant as a safety feature for remote access.

#### <u>Syslog</u>

System log messages. Inactive.

#### <u>System</u>

For restart. Do not use the firmware update because the Heyl network logger process runs differently!

#### <u>XML</u>

To export and import settings.





### 7.2.1 Addresses of the web interface

If 192.168.0.10 is set as the IP address of the Ethernet converter, the web interface can be reached at the following addresses:

The display only works if JavaScript is activated in the browser!

The easiest way to access the files with the measurement data and messages is in the web browser via the setting of the Ethernet converter in the menu Filesystem.

### 7.2.2 Using monthly data display

- 1. Select the month and year of the measuring data to be displayed.
- 2. Now press the **OK** button.

According to the CSV file available, their name and path will be generated from the selection.

A help function is available next to the **OK** button.

### 7.2.3 Using the current measured value display

The display is fully automatic. The number of measuring points is automatically detected based on incoming data after the second measured value.

If an alarm has occurred during device run time, the last alarm is shown. Clicking on the **Acknowledge** button will ensure this error message is no longer shown, only new ones. The display updates automatically.



### 7.3 Set up e-mail dispatch

### NOTE

#### The Ethernet converter does not send e-mails

The Ethernet converter only supports dispatch via so-called open SMTP servers that do not require a password. Authentication is not used!

- Ask your system administrator for access data
- Set up dispatch via an open SMTP server.
- For security reasons, such servers are now very rare. They are not used for normal email sending.

You will find the settings in the menu Email. The setting for the SMTP server that forwards sent e-mails can be found under Protocol Stack

 $\rightarrow$  SMTP  $\rightarrow$  Relay Address.

Sending can be turned on and off using the priority setting, separated for

- Measurement data in e-mail 1
- Notifications in e-mail 2
- Limit value exceedances in e-mail 3

Sending is active when the SMTP Relay (see above) is set and the following fields are filled out in the e-mail configuration:

- To: Existing destination address
- From: Any address for the network logger itself. It need not actually exist (you cannot send e-mails to the Testomat 2000<sup>®</sup>), but should correspond to the syntax of a correct e-mail address.
   Example: Testomat2000@firma.de
- Subject: Any text must be present. Examples: "Measured value" for Email1, "Notification" for Email2, "Limit value exceedance" for Email3.
- Set up *Priority*: Urgent, High, Normal or Low. With Very Low no e-mail is created!
- 1. Check the settings you have made by triggering a test e-mail with Send Email.

The setting Email 4 is not used. It can be used, for example, to send files by e-mail via the web interface by specifying the file under Message File. You must specify the full path with file name.

Example (Measured data from 2014): http/14/ME1407.CSV

Under Statistics the e-mail transfer log can be viewed.

### 7.4 File access with FTP

During operation, all measured values and messages are stored in the flash memory of the Ethernet converter. Measured values and alarms are filed in the root directory, sorted by year. The use of an SD card is, therefore, unnecessary. Monthly measured values (e.g. 07/2009) are stored in a file "ME0907.CSV". Errors that occurred are stored in another file "AL0907.CSV".

Access is possible using Windows Explorer on Windows PCs:

- Enter the ftp://<IP address of the Testomat Pro>.
- 2. A window Anmelden als appears. Enter the username and password for FTP access (Standard: "admin", "PASS").
- 3. Afterwards, the file system of the Ethernet converter with the directory "http" is displayed in the explorer. This contains the measured values and notifications sorted by year.

### 7.5 File access with web interface

Measured values and notification files can also be downloaded via the menu  $Filesystem \rightarrow Browse$ . All data for one month is stored in the folder http (subfolder for the corresponding year).

### 7.6 Evaluating the CSV files on the PC

#### Data loss in the event of incorrect storage!

Do not save files for further processing in "CSV" format as this causes file formatting information to be lost.

• Always use the original software format for saving!

To analyse data, you can transfer the data to your PC by downloading it with the help of the web interface or via FTP transfer. The CSV files can be read/edited by using "Microsoft Excel". Open the file with "Data" and "From Text CSV". Select " Data types not recognized" for data type detection.

After opening the measured value file (e.g. ME090713.CSV) a picture appears on the monitor with all the daily measured values:

### 7.7 Message forwarding to TCP/IP port

All notifications and measured values can also be forwarded on in CSV raw data format to any TCP/IP port for linking with devices and SPS.

You will find the settings in the menu Line, Line 1 Configuration:

- Interface: RS232
- o State: Enabled
- o Protocol: Tunnel
- o Parity: None
- Data Bits: 8
- Stop Bits: 1
- o Flow Control: None
- The settings for Gap Timer and Threshold need not be changed.

### 7.8 Perform network logger maintenance

Check the available storage space every six months.

1. In the menu <code>Filesystem</code>  $\rightarrow$  Statistics select the menu item Clean Space.

It displays the available storage space for log files.

- If the storage space is too low (<20%), transfer the log files to a PC and then delete the files from the network logger. This will avoid data loss. The oldest data is automatically deleted if there is no more storage space.
- 3. In the menu, start the Filesystem → Statistics action "Compact". This takes around 30 seconds and causes all files to be refreshed and old files to be removed.

### 8 Operation

### 8.1 Normal operation

#### The device has no power switch.

Use an external power switch to turn the unit on and off. The switch must be installed next to the device and must be marked as power switch for the device - for example with a label.

#### **Delayed reaction:**

During analysis, the response to any key presses may be delayed.

#### Handling of error messages/warning messages:

Eliminate the cause of the error and then acknowledge the message with the **Alarm** button.

### 8.2 Operational monitoring: Alarm/Message

Error messages are adapted to the selected language, but can also be identified by an error number, regardless of the language used. All errors are, regardless of the settings made in this menu option:

- stored on SD card if Storing of error messages has been activated
- recorded in the error history (the last 20 error messages)
- and sent via the serial RS232 interface.

Detailed information on possible error messages as well as their cause and remedy is found in chapter 8.4 <u>Troubleshooting and repair</u> on page 62.

#### Water shortage

The water shortage error is a special case, since one further setting can be configured for this error. In the menu, under Basic program => Water low count the number of consecutively occurring errors before the alarm is triggered can be set. An error is then generated for each measurement cycle. The function Water low count is specially provided for systems subject to intermittent low water pressure errors, which trigger a water shortage error in the device.

1. For instant reporting, set the quantity to 0 or up to 250 measurement attempts until the error is reported.

Normally, the next measurement is started when there is a lack of water. An interval pause until the next measuring cycle can be set under .

### 8.3 Firmware update

### 8.3.1 Menu-driven firmware update

In the menu Basic program => Firmware update the operating software of the Testomat<sup>®-</sup> device is updated. For this purpose, you need an SD card. During the firmware update, the red LED lights up next to the SD card plug-in slot (which indicates that the so-called bootloader is active).

## Handling may cause damage or destruction of electrical components!

If you have to open the equipment's top door, electrical components may be damaged or destroyed by electrostatic discharge.

- Take appropriate precautions to avoid electrostatic discharge (ESD protection).
- Make sure you are earthed before opening the casing.

Implement the firmware update as follows:

- 1. Download the firmware update for the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN from the Heyl website.
- 2. Save the firmware in the root directory of the SD card to be inserted into the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN.
- 3. Insert the SD card into the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN.
- 4. Select the menu Basic program => Firmware update.
- 5. Confirm the selection with **OK**.
- 6. Select the filename of the update. If only one file exists, only confirmation is required.
- 7. Confirm the selection with **OK**.
- 8. The Testomat restarts and implements the update. In this mode, although no text is output, the status is indicated via the LEDs of the SD card (see figure 31) as well as those on the control card (see figure 33 on page 68). The programming progress is indicated as bars with five LEDs on the control card: Initially, only LED1 flashes (in the vicinity of the plug connector to the motherboard) slowly (once every two seconds) and later permanently, whereupon the next LED begins flashing. The process is repeated until all LEDs light up permanently. The firmware update is now complete. The Testomat is started automatically with the new operating software. The complete firmware update takes around 70 seconds.

#### Possible errors:

If both LEDs flash or light up next to the SD card, there is a problem with the SD card itself. The update could not be started. The existing firmware remains unchanged.

If the LEDs next to the SD card are inactive, but the LEDs on the control card flash quickly (10x per second), an error has occurred during the update.

#### Obtain the settings after the firmware update

After a firmware update, the device may be in an undefined state. After a firmware update, basic programming should therefore always be performed. If the settings have been preserved, it is advisable to export the settings onto the SD card before the firmware update and after the firmware update, to import the saved settings. The set password is preserved even after the firmware update.

During the update a file called "update.txt" is written onto the SD card, which includes a record of the update progress and any errors having occurred in the process. Open these files with your editor of choice (e.g. Notepad), to read the relevant content. The file is not deleted but supplemented. If the same SD card is always used for a device, it will provide an overview of all the firm-ware updates performed for the device in question.

### 8.3.2 Manual firmware update

The manual firmware update facilitates the recovery of software after failed firmware updates. The display and device buttons are not used in the process. For the manual firmware update, an SD card with the firmware file must be inserted in the equipment.

# Handling may cause damage or destruction of electrical components!

If you have to open the equipment's top door, electrical components may be damaged or destroyed by electrostatic discharge.

- Take appropriate precautions to avoid electrostatic discharge (ESD protection).
- Make sure you are earthed before opening the casing.

When performing a manual firmware update, proceed as follows:

- 1. Press and hold **BOOT** (1) on the control card. Then briefly press the **RESET** button (2).
- 2. Release **BOOT** when the update starts.
  - The update process progresses automatically. Progress is shown by the LED lights. In case of several software versions on the SD card the newest version is loaded.

#### Possible errors:

- If both LEDs flash or light up next to the SD card, there is a problem with the SD card itself. The update could not be started. The existing firmware remains unchanged.
- If the LEDs next to the SD card are inactive, but the LEDs on the control card flash quickly (10x per second), an error has occurred during the update.







#### 8.3.3 Firmware update Ethernet converter

The integrated Ethernet converter can be updated to the latest software version via the network. To update, you need a PC with network access to the Testomat and its IP address.

The process is as follows:

- 1. Download the update in the download section of the Heyl website.
- 2. Unzip the zip archive on the PC.
- 3. Start the executable program.
  - Files are extracted and the update process begins after entering the IP address. The process takes about a minute. The program displays the progress.
- 4. Restart the converter.

### 8.4 Troubleshooting and repair

Once a protective device has been triggered (safety fuse), initially try resolving the cause of error (e.g. by replacing a defective valve), before reactivating the protective device. Frequent triggering always signifies an error, which under certain circumstances may also damage the device.

Errors will be recorded in the error history as far as capacity allows (after which the oldest message will be deleted). In addition, error messages can be stored on the SD card. Process as follows:

- FUNCTION SD Card Store measurement Store error -Import basic data Export basic data
- Select Basic program => Function SD-Card => Store error.
- 2. Activate the function with OK.

Details of errors are always sent via the serial RS32 interface. Errors are handled differently depending on type:

All errors, for which user access is required to recover the function of the device, are shown as alerts. In addition, an alarm may be triggered. However, it is not possible to completely disable the message, since the selection "–" is locked in the menu. In the event of such error occurring, the device reverts to pause mode. When these errors are acknowledged with the **Alarm** button, they are deleted, and the pause mode can be ended. In the event of any recurrence, the set action (message or alarm) is again triggered. For such errors, the time of occurrence is recorded in a log.

All errors that occur only intermittently, which means they impact only on the analysis process, are cyclically checked by the device and automatically deleted when no longer present. If these error messages are acknowledged, only the alarm is deactivated. The error message is not, however, deleted. It is deleted only when the error no longer occurs after rechecking (namely, during the following analysis, either automatically or when manually started). These errors can also be ignored when in the menu Alarm/message – is selected.

In the error history the start and end time are logged. Likewise, two notification messages are written via the serial interface and onto the SD

card with the start and end times of the error. Regardless of the case, the analyses are continued. Access the error history as follows:

- 1. Select Service => Error History to call up error history.
- 2. Select Show (OK), to show the list of error messages.
- 3. Confirm the input with **OK**.
- 4. Select an error message from the list using the arrow keys.
  - > The time and date of the occurrence are shown.
- 5. Again, press OK.
  - Now depending on the error type the start and end of the error are shown.
    - If the error remains current, no end time is registered.
- 6. To delete the entire list, select Delete (OK) 20.
  - The number indicates the number of stored notifications. The error history has room for up to 20 notifications.

The following errors may occur and can be corrected as described. The troubleshooting measures may only be carried out by employees who have the requisite qualifications as described in <u>chapter 1.3.3</u> <u>Qualification of personnel</u> on page 3. ## 8.4.3 Firmware update error list

Firmware update error und error after self test can be distinguished using the red LED next to the SD card. If the LED lights up, the bootloader is active, and the error concerned occurred during the firmware update. If the LED is inactive, it is an error after the self-test. The error category is based on the number of simultaneously flashing LEDs on the control card (for the precise error description, refer to the following table). Under normal cases, a firmware update is completed within 70 seconds.

The following options are available:

- All five LEDs flash quickly: SD card cannot be read. Replace card. If the attempted replacement fails, there is a defect on the control card. Contact customer support; the device must be repaired.
- **Three or four LEDs flash quickly**: Defect on the control card. Contact customer support; the device must be repaired.
- **Two LEDs flash quickly**: The file for the firmware update was found but is invalid or defective. Re-download the file.
- **One LED flashes quickly**: Problem with SD card (Write protection, formatting).
- For the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN the filename should correspond to the following format: "100M001S00.UPD", where 001 is the version number, which increases incrementally as new versions are released.
- **LED bars not extended:** They revert to the original configuration after some time has elapsed and start from scratch: The means that during the programming, an error was detected and an attempt was made to resolve the error by repeating the update process. The entire programming process is repeated up to five times. For each repeat, the entire programming process is relaunched from the start, whereupon the LED bars "emerge".

If, after five attempts, it is still impossible to perform any successful update, the LEDs show an error corresponding to the list on the following page. The device or the control card requires repair. Also send – particularly in this case – the content of the log file on the SD card "update.txt" with the item or enclose the SD card with the device.

## 9.1 Leak resistance test

The equipment must be checked for leaks before the first analysis and after any maintenance work. Proceed as follows:

- 1. Switch the device to **Pause**.
- 2. Fill the measuring chamber during manual operation.
- 3. Measure out the reagent dose by hand. To do so, press the **Manual** button on the dosing pump.
- 4. Check the connections and sealing points for leakage.

## 9.2 Replacing reagents

- 2. Check that the measuring chamber is completely emptied.
- Connect the manual valve of the secondary line to the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN.
- 4. Release the spring lock (see figure 36), tilt the measuring chamber upwards and take it out.
- 5. Remove both the sight glass holders (see figure 37).

- 6. Remove the sight glasses for cleaning.
- 7. Remove the film on the sight glasses with isopropanol.

# 9.4 Cleaning the filter housing

The filter housing must be cleaned every 6 months. Clean the filter housing as follows:

- 3. Release the piping system of the Testomat<sup>®</sup> PRO Ca SELF CLEAN with the function Internal flush manually.

- 6. Unscrew the inlet connector.
- 7. Remove the seal, spring and filter.
- 8. Clean the seal, spring and filter.
- 9. Remove the retaining pin and extract the flow regulator.
- 10. Remove the flow governor core.
- 11. Clean the filter housing with water or isopropanol.
- 12. Reassemble the filter housing so that the filter screen is inserted with the tip facing downwards.
- 13. Attach the hose connections to the filter housing.

# Handling may cause damage or destruction of electrical components!

If you have to open the equipment's top door, electrical components may be damaged or destroyed by electrostatic discharge.

- Take appropriate precautions to avoid electrostatic discharge (ESD protection).
- Make sure you are earthed before opening the casing.

When the device is switched off the internal clock is powered by a lithium backup battery (CR2032 type), which is designed to have a service life of 10 years. After this period, it should be replaced for preventive reasons, and always ensuring a measured voltage <2.3 V.

The following is required when replacing the battery:

- A Phillips-tip screwdriver
- A replacement battery CR 2032

Replace the battery (1) as follows:

- 1. Switch off the device and disconnect it from the power supply.
- 2. Open the upper housing door.
- 3. Remove both fixing screws (2) of the upper and lower control card on the motherboard.
- 4. Remove the control card.
- 5. Using a non-conductive tool, carefully prise the used battery out of its mounting. Avoid damaging the circuit board with the sharp edge of a screwdriver.
- 6. Insert a new battery.
- 7. Reconstruct the circuit board by following the steps for dismantling of the same in reverse.

# 9.7 Maintenance of pump head

# 9.7.1 Replacing the pump head

To replace the pump head, proceed as described below:

- 1. Remove the transparent cover.
- 2. Open the housing with a suitable screwdriver (push down the snapon fastening on both sides).
- 3. Carefully pull-out the pump head with a drive mounting bracket.
- 4. Loosen both screws (3) at the pump head.
- 5. Pull the pump head from the motor shaft.
- 6. Place the new pump head on the shaft. The short hose with the stopper (4) must be on the left-hand side.

#### Anti-twist guard

Observe the anti-twist guard on the motor shaft and the pump head during installation! The drill hole and the shaft each have a flat surface and only fit together in one position. Carefully turn the pump head into the correct position until the snap-in noses snap into the provided drill holes in the housing.

7. Re-assemble the pump in reverse order. Make sure that wires or hoses are not trapped.

Do not place the drive mounting bracket on the top slide-in rail (5), as this could cause the pump head to come into contact with the circuit board.

## 9.7.2 Reset counter

When the pump has been serviced, you must reset the counter. The counter shows how much time is left until the next scheduled maintenance.

- Select the menu SERVICE => Diagnosis => Service pump head => Reset counter.
- 2. Confirm the entry by pressing "OK".
  - > The counter is reset.
